Brownies	1	Rivers Early Peach Dessert apple , first recorded in 1893 and raised by Rivers' Nursery at Sawbridgeworth. It has a medium sized yellow apple with a slight reddish flush. Coarse flesh that is dry but sweet, tasting of peaches. The fruit is picked and used in early August.	Jenyns Class 2	12	Warner's King culinary apple , first recorded in the 1700s. Sent to Rivers' Nursery as King Apple by Mr. Warner, but may be the same variety as Killick's Apple which was known previously in Kent. A medium to large sized yellow apple that becomes greasy when stored. Cooks to a pleasant acidic puree. The fruit is picked in late September and used in September to December.
Parish council	2	Rivers Early Peach dessert apple , first recorded in 1893 and raised by Rivers' Nursery at Sawbridgeworth. It has a medium sized yellow apple with a slight reddish flush. Coarse flesh that is dry but sweet, tasting of peaches. The fruit is picked and used in early August.	Art@Gravelly Barn	13	Olympia dual purpose plum first recorded in 1904. Raised by Laxton Brothers in Bedfordshire and introduced in 1937. A large oval blue-black coloured plum with a bloom The fruit is picked and used in early to mid September.
St. Mary's	3	Rivers Nonsuch dessert apple , first recorded in the 1800s Raised by Rivers' Nursery at Sawbridgeworth. A tall, yellow apple with red stripes and a rich fruity flesh. The fruit is picked in mid-October and used in October to November.	Drama group	14	Olympia dual purpose plum first recorded in 1904. Raised by Laxton Brothers in Bedfordshire and introduced in 1937. A large oval blue-black coloured plum with a bloom The fruit is picked and used in early to mid September.
Music society	4	Rivers Nonsuch dessert apple , first recorded in the 1800s Raised by Rivers' Nursery at Sawbridgeworth. A tall, yellow apple with red stripes and a rich fruity flesh. The fruit is picked in mid-October and used in October to November.	Horticultural society	15	Fertility pear first recorded in 1875. Raised at Rivers' Nursery. A medium sized yellowish pear covered with a delicate cinnamon russet. Flavour similar to Williams Bon Chretien, but more aromatic. The fruit is picked in September and used in October.
Jenyns Class 1	5	Dawn dessert apple , first recorded in 1940 and believed to have been raised by Mr. Staward at Ware Park Gardens. A medium sized golden coloured apple with a dull dark red flush. Slightly acidic. The fruit is picked in late October and used in November to January/March.	Playing Fields Association Trust	16	Fertility pear first recorded in 1875. Raised at Rivers' Nursery. A medium sized yellowish pear covered with a delicate cinnamon russet. Flavour similar to Williams Bon Chretien, but more aromatic. The fruit is picked in September and used in October.
Friends of St. Mary's	6	Dawn dessert apple , first recorded in 1940 and believed to have been raised by Mr. Staward at Ware Park Gardens. A medium sized golden coloured apple with a dull dark red flush. Slightly acidic. The fruit is picked in late October and used in November to January/March.	Cheetahs	17	Beacon pear , first recorded in 1881. Raised at Rivers' Nursery in Sawbridgeworth. One parent is the variety Calabasse Grosse. A medium sized pear with a dull red flush and some russet. Flesh tender and juicy. The fruit is picked in mid- August and used in August to September.
Bellringers	7	Lord Lambourne - dessert apple , first recorded in 1907 in Bedfordshire. It is a reliable cropper with bright striped fruit, moderately sweet, aromatic with some flavour of strawberry. The fruit is picked in September and used in November.	Braughing WI	18	Beacon pear , first recorded in 1881. Raised at Rivers' Nursery in Sawbridgeworth. One parent is the variety Calabasse Grosse. A medium sized pear with a dull red flush and some russet. Flesh tender and juicy. The fruit is picked in mid- August and used in August to September.
Aviation society	8	Lord Lambourne - Dessert apple , first recorded in 1907 in Bedfordshire. It is a reliable cropper with bright striped fruit, moderately sweet, aromatic with some flavour of strawberry. The fruit is picked in September and used in November.	Freda Williamson	19	St. Luke dessert pear , first recorded in 1897. Raised at Rivers' Nursery. Parentage not known. A small short, conical greenish skinned pear almost totally covered with a brownish grey russet and russet dots. Flesh is juicy but slightly gritty. The fruit is picked in October and used in Early November.
3VEG	9	Hormead Pearmain - culinary apple , first recorded in 1826. Probably arose originally in the village of Great Hormead. A large dull yellow apple with an occasional slight orange flush and some russetting. The flesh is quite coarse and slightly acidic. The fruit is picked in late October and used in November to March.	Tennis club	20	St. Luke dessert pear , first recorded in 1897. Raised at Rivers' Nursery. Parentage not known. A small short, conical greenish skinned pear almost totally covered with a brownish grey russet and russet dots. Flesh is juicy but slightly gritty. The fruit is picked in October and used in Early November.
Jenyns Class 3	10	Hormead Pearmain - culinary apple , first recorded in 1826. Probably arose originally in the village of Great Hormead. A large dull yellow apple with an occasional slight orange flush and some russetting. The flesh is quite coarse and slightly acidic. The fruit is picked in late October and used in November to March.	Methodist Chapel	21	Caroon cherry , first recorded in 1725. Recorded as being grown around Geddeston in the 1700s, it is a medium sized, roundish, shiny black skinned fruit with dark purple flesh The fruit is picked and used in mid to late July
History society	11	Warner's King culinary apple , first recorded in the 1700s. Sent to Rivers' Nursery as King Apple by Mr. Warner, but may be the same variety as Killick's Apple which was known previously in Kent. A medium to large sized yellow apple that becomes greasy when stored. Cooks to a pleasant acidic puree. The fruit is picked in late September and used in September to December.
